President's Report – 2025/26 AGM

Introduction

This past season was a very busy one for Burnaby Minor Hockey as a whole. We accomplished a great deal and have laid the groundwork for strong hockey programming for years to come.

Executive

Our Executive welcomed several new faces this season while benefiting from the experience of returning members.

The Board had valuable experience from the previous season and got to work right away. It takes a tremendous amount of volunteer effort to get the pre-season underway and to organize Rep tryouts. We had waitlists for a couple of our programs but were pleased that every player ultimately found a place on a team.

As Larry Hayes decided last year to retire from the role of Executive Administrator, we were fortunate to have Rebecca Chau join our team to assist with the transition throughout this past season. Thank you, Rebecca!

The Volunteer Program continued for its second year. A huge shout-out to Jason Uy for his work in creating a much-needed support system for our teams. We also expanded our Livestreaming Program by adding scoreboards to the broadcasts as well as introducing Plays of the Month. While both initiatives require investment from the Association, we hope that families continue to see the value they provide.

The Pat Quinn Classic was a tremendous success, attracting more teams and several international entries. The Spring Blast Tournament was very well attended and received outstanding feedback from participants and visiting associations alike.

Spring programming continued for its second year in earnest, with all of our camps consistently filling to or near capacity.

The Board also remained focused on several larger initiatives, including the ongoing Wildcats asset transfer and the successful approval of additional support roles. In January, we met to establish a three-year vision for the Association. We also undertook a comprehensive Request for Proposal (RFP) process for all support roles, which required considerable effort from the entire Executive team.

As this is my final year as President, I would like to sincerely thank the Executive for their dedication, professionalism, and countless volunteer hours. It has been a privilege to work alongside such a committed group of individuals, and I wish everyone continued success both within hockey and beyond.

Membership

The Association had a total of 704 members across 42 teams. The number of players and teams increased by around 16% year over year (when compared to Integrated in the previous season). Our goalie development program continues to show positive results, as we had strong goalie participation across all divisions this season. Thank you to all of our goalie families for their commitment and support.

We are proud of the accomplishments of all of our teams. We celebrated multiple banner winners and received many reports of positive and engaging experiences for our players. Thank you to all of the coaches, managers, safety personnel, and parents who dedicate so much time and energy to making hockey a positive experience for our kids.

Development

One of our strongest accomplishments on the ice was the continued growth of our Development Program. Our philosophy remains that a focused and consistent development plan is essential for every player at BMHA.

This season, players benefited from structured programming, position-specific instruction, goalie development, and enhanced coach support. We are fortunate to work with strong development providers who continue to deliver high-quality programming and help our players reach their potential. Their efforts play a critical role in ensuring that hockey remains both enjoyable and rewarding for every player in our Association.

Farewell

A couple of our Executive members are now “aging out” and have advised the Board that they do not intend to seek positions next season.

Jason Uy has been a long-time volunteer with the Association. He has consistently been a trusted resource for Team Managers and Division Managers alike. His experience and leadership will be sorely missed. As Director of Volunteers, Jason single-handedly created the Volunteer Program, brought livestreaming to our membership, and helped bring the Spring Blast Tournament to life, making it one of the highlights of the season for dozens of U11, U13, and U15 teams. Thank you, Jason, for everything you have contributed to Burnaby Minor Hockey.

Neale Quan has been a long-time coach and development provider with BMHA. He has coached both Rep and House teams and has mentored countless coaches across all age groups. Since joining the Board two years ago, Neale has helped us elevate and maintain excellence in programming throughout the Association. Despite both of his children having moved on from BMHA, Neale continued to dedicate countless hours to improving the experience for our members. His commitment speaks volumes about his character and passion for community hockey. Thank you, Neale.

Next Season

My son is now playing U21 hockey, and my daughter will be playing with the Wildcats this coming season. We joined BMHA when my son was five years old in what was then H1.

Over the years, our family has been fortunate to be part of many outstanding teams and to learn from many dedicated coaches and volunteers. I have coached every year since joining the Association and have learned an incredible amount from those around me.

At the same time, one opportunity we identified was the need for a more consistent development pathway for both players and coaches. Our goal is to ensure that every player and coach receives the support, resources, and development opportunities needed to improve year after year. Players deserve a consistent approach that allows them to learn the game, build confidence, and reach their full potential.

Our Director of Hockey Operations (DoHo) joined the BMHA team last season. Ty Babych has been contracted, within our existing development budget, to oversee both on-ice and off-ice development. The on-ice component has already shown tremendous promise. Ty led our development sessions this past season and received exceptional feedback from players and parents alike.

Ty will also continue to lead and organize coach development initiatives. This will provide support throughout the coaching journey, from a parent stepping onto the ice for the first time to experienced coaches looking to continue developing their skills. Ty brings an impressive hockey background and a passion for teaching that will benefit our players and coaches for years to come.

Over the past five years, BMHA has seen 28 Board members come and go. While volunteer turnover is a natural part of any organization, it can create challenges with continuity, long-term planning, and program execution. Throughout BMHA's history, volunteers have stepped forward to support on-ice programming whenever needed, and their efforts have been greatly appreciated. Maintaining consistency can be challenging when leadership changes over time, but I am confident that the work completed over the past several seasons has established a strong foundation for future Boards to build upon.

Conclusion

We are extremely proud of what was accomplished this season. While we faced challenges along the way, we delivered a successful season on and off the ice. Our players benefited from a stronger hockey experience, and we have positioned the Association well for continued success in the years ahead.

None of this would be possible without the dedication of the more than 300 volunteers who contribute their time and energy throughout the season. Your commitment is the foundation of everything we do.

When my family first joined Burnaby Minor Hockey, I never imagined the friendships, experiences, and memories we would gain through this Association. After serving on the Executive since 2019 and as President for the past two seasons, I leave knowing that BMHA is well-positioned for the future. Serving as President has been both an honour and a privilege.

Thank you to every volunteer, coach, official, parent, player, and Board member who makes BMHA such a special place.

As always, I am only an email or phone call away. Thank you for your support, and I wish everyone a wonderful season ahead.

2025-2026 Area of Responsibility

First and foremost, thank you to all HCSPs, coaches, team and division managers, and families for your support throughout the season. Your efforts in keeping everyone safe and representing BMHA positively—both on and off the ice—have made a meaningful impact on our association and community.

As I complete my second term as VP of Risk, it has been inspiring to continue witnessing the collaboration, commitment, and enthusiasm of members who contribute not only for their own children, but for the hockey community as a whole.

I would also like to thank the executive committee for their teamwork, countless hours, and unwavering dedication to making BMHA what it is today. Your leadership and commitment throughout the season have been sincerely appreciated.

Looking ahead to the 2026–27 season, I remain committed to supporting the safety, compliance, and accountability of our players, parents, volunteers, and officials in alignment with the standards and policies established by our governing bodies. Our collective focus on risk mitigation helps ensure a safe and positive environment for all members of our association.

Have a wonderful summer, and I look forward to the 2026–27 season ahead. We couldn't do it without you.

Please see below for a summary of this year's activities.

Criminal Record Checks (CRC)

Continuing the efficiencies introduced through the CRC online platform for up-to-date verifications, I have processed and completed more than 160 criminal record checks (new and renewal submissions) since August 2025. The streamlined process has continued to improve turnaround times and administrative efficiency for volunteers and the association.

Reimbursement for HCSP and RIS Course Fees

As part of our ongoing commitment to improving the volunteer experience, the online reimbursement process for Hockey Canada Safety Program (HCSP) and Respect in Sport (RIS) course fees completed its fourth year of operation.

The process has significantly reduced wait times and enabled faster, more convenient reimbursements for families through e-transfer. This season, we processed and reimbursed 51 RIS certifications and 23 HCSP certifications.

I would also like to recognize and thank our Treasurer, John Mak, for his continued support in helping keep this process running smoothly and efficiently.

PCAHA Team Official Certifications

We continued to reduce administrative overhead associated with team re-rostering by validating team officials' certifications during the initial rostering process. Working closely with David Jacobucci and our division managers, we focused on finalizing rosters early and ensuring all required qualifications—including coaching certifications, HCSP, RIS, and CRC requirements—were completed in a timely manner to minimize disruptions throughout the season.

Insurability, equipment & dressing room policies

To maintain valid insurance coverage for all players, coaches, and on-ice volunteers, BMHA continues to adhere to Hockey Canada and BC Hockey insurance policies, including mandatory verification of insurability for third-party development coaches. Reinforcing the need for continued diligence in upholding equipment standards, CSA-approved helmets with valid certification stickers remain mandatory for all players and coaches.

Teams were also reminded that special sanctioning approval is required for any non-hockey programming on BMHA ice, and that non-rostered officials and family members are not permitted on the ice during these events for safety and liability reasons.

Finally, maintaining equality, inclusivity, and a safe dressing room environment—including during tryouts, rust removal, and high-performance sessions—remains a priority in alignment with Hockey Canada policies.

Disciplinary process

Establish clearer guidelines and maintain consistent processes through our discipline bylaws for handling all levels of discipline matters and complaints across the association.

Vice President Programs Report

Thank you to all our volunteers for your time, effort and support to help make our programs successful. We tried to expand from the previous season with our programs by adding rep development but with the addition of more teams, we simply did not have the ice to provide regular ice times for development to all divisions. However, we have a plan heading into next season to find the ice to offer more regular extra development to our rep divisions which will be coordinated by our Director of Hockey Operations.

There was a transition this past season with the addition of the Director of Hockey Operations position and how it should be integrated with the VP Programs position and the (former) Head Coach Executive Committee position. Hopefully those challenges have been fully addressed, and this upcoming season should be smoother where roles and responsibilities are more clearly established.

I will not be returning to the BMHA Executive Committee so I wish my replacement the best and I offer my support by being available for any questions that may arise.

BMHA Treasurer's AGM Report - June xx, 2026

The Budget for the Fiscal Year Ending March 31, 2027 as approved by the BMHA Executive is attached. The internally prepared Financial Statements for the FYE 2026 are also attached.

For the Fiscal Year Ending March 31, 2026 BMHA incurred a deficit of \$106,668. This was funded by BMHA's cash reserves which decreased by almost \$106,000 over the past year.

A number of factors contributed to the deficit. As this was the first full year after the separation of the Wildcats division, its impact on the budgeted revenues and expenses was not fully appreciated until the conclusion of this fiscal year. Although some costs decreased due to the decrease in overall player figures, many of the overhead costs were comparable or even increased over the past year. With registration fees per player remaining static, and the 2026 budget already forecasting a \$38,600 deficit, it was inevitable that 2026 would be a challenging year financially for BMHA.

Commentary on Budget vs Actual amounts, FYE2026:

- Registration fees were higher than budgeted as overall demand for registration remained high. Rep fees collected were also higher than budgeted, although these were offset by the Rep Coach Stipend being significantly over budget also.
- The budgeted decrease in the Gaming Grant did not materialize, and the grant amount received of \$100,000 was the same as prior years.
- Contractor payments were forecast to decrease in proportion to the decrease in player numbers, which was a false assumption. In fact, with the retirement and transition of Larry Hayes as Executive Administrator, Contractor fees went up over the previous year.
- Ice costs decreased, although not as much as was forecasted, since registration figures came in higher than expected. BMHA sought more ice from the City of Burnaby and Scotiabarn in order to accommodate this and provide more development programs.
- This was also the first year having a DOHO, so player development costs also increased.

It is important to recognize and appreciate that registration fees have been unchanged from FYE2022. Despite BMHA's best efforts, it is no longer feasible to continue this policy in today's inflationary environment while still trying to expand growth and development opportunities for players. Therefore, we are proposing an approximate increase of 10% across the U9 to U21 Divisions, once the Early Bird Registration discount is taken into consideration.

The Finance Committee has thoroughly considered each line item in the budget and tried to minimize spending on non-essential items as much as possible. However, many costs outside of our control are forecasted to increase, including:

- Ice costs
- PCAHA and BC Hockey fees
- Referee fees

The FYE2027 budget forecasts a surplus of approximately \$38,000. This is contingent upon receiving the same Gaming Grant amount as in previous years.

Another season has come and gone! This season brought the usual ups, downs, twists and turns for our rep teams but through it all we learned, grew and made some wonderful new connections as a Bulldog community. Thank you to all of the players, parents, coaches, managers, treasurers, hcsp's, party planners and all other team volunteers for making it another season to remember. Thank you to the staff of BMHA and the City of Burnaby, as well as the BMHA Board for taking care of the behind the scenes details that go into making a season and a hockey club like ours run. While things don't always go as we planned, we get through it together, and when that final buzzer sounds we wonder how it passed so quickly. Teamwork all around...Go Bulldogs!

1. 2025-26 Rep Tryouts

The season kicked off back in August with our high performance camps leading into our rep hockey tryouts. 230 BMHA players registered to take part in rep tryouts this past season and after two rounds of releases, teams were set by end of September and composed per the chart below. Many families took advantage, as was outlined in the rep tryout process, to request to receive consolidated rep tryout evaluator notes for their player. These were provided via our Director of Hockey Operations Ty Babych, who compiled the feedback from the rep tryout evaluators. We received great feedback on these thorough notes and are hopeful that players were able to use them to help guide their development this past season. We hope to see you again at this year's tryouts.

Overall we had great parent volunteer participation during rep tryouts and we had great feedback about how the tryouts were run.

One area of opportunity identified was the tryout team pinnies...I agree! You will be pleased to know that new numbered pinnies have been requested for this season's tryouts and in a multitude of colours.

3. New Division Manager for U11-U13

I want to say a special thank you to Shayleigh Bennest for all of her assistance this season with regard to ensuring any communications from PCAHA were distributed quickly and for acting as a day-to-day liaison to team managers and coaches. She was also great at ensuring all team rostered officials had their required certifications prior to rostering deadlines and responding to ice allocation and schedule questions as they arose. It was wonderful to have extra assistance this year to ensure that the 4 teams under her purview had another resource to ensure that any questions the team manager or parents had, were responded to in a timely manner. Thank you again to Shayleigh for volunteering to help ensure the season ran so smoothly!

4. Affiliated Players

Players who are released from rep teams are often asked if they would be willing to be affiliated players ("AP") to those same teams. A1 teams may affiliate from an A2 team or house team (generally A2) and A2 from the house team level. Based on observation this past season, there is a need to formalize this process. I will be developing a more standardized AP process to ensure that home teams, AP'ing teams, parents and players are on the same page with regard to making AP requests for teams, for games, and overall to facilitate improved general communication and expectation around what it means to be an AP.

5. Tournaments

Our rep teams represented Burnaby at home, throughout the Province and as far away as Chicago this past season. Travel tournaments are some of the best memories of any players experience and why at least 1 travel (out of town overnight stay) tournament is highly recommended for each rep team.

The holiday season tournaments (as shared via social media on the BMHA accounts) brought strong results for our A/Rep program. Congratulations again to all of our teams who played in holiday tournaments, the final results were as follows:

In addition, A2 Assistant Coach Ethan Gill was selected as a coach for the team the BMHA players were placed on. The tournament was another wonderful showcase opportunity for the players selected to represent Burnaby within PCAHA.

6. Regular Season & Playoff Success

We had some fantastic results in our rep program this regular season with three of our teams bringing home banners on behalf of Burnaby minor from their respective flights including U18 A1, U18 A2 and the U15 A2 team. Many of our teams had great playoff runs including our U15 A2 team who made it to their playoff championship game and our U18 A1 team who made it to the Tier 1 Final Four playoffs.

7. PCEHL U13 “Hub Team”

Information regarding the new PCAHA U13 hub team info was distributed to the association membership via email and social media in early April and tryouts are underway. We are optimistic that some of our players who have registered will be selected for this combined Burnaby, Vancouver Minor, Tbirds, Arbutus Club hub team this spring. This is a pilot program being run by PCAHA and we will share more updates and information on how it is progressing as it becomes available.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – JUNE 10, 2026

In my second year as Director of Growth we saw a lot of new members become coaches and a lot of growth within the Bulldogs! Our U7 division had 4 teams this year with many new faces. Our division manager, George Gomroy did an excellent job recruiting managers and coaches, and Jesse Paris was an amazing resource for the coaches starting their hockey journey in U7. He was available day and night to answer questions for the new coaches and to help them learn the ropes of minor hockey. We had the luxury of having beloved former U5 coach, Paolo Guistino, join us in U7 this year. His energetic and love for helping young players find their passion for the sport is evident as the frequent requests to join his team fill my inbox!

On the U9 things this year, Ally Janmohammad did an amazing job as division manager. He had 7 teams under his purview, 2 major teams and 5 minor teams. A fierce advocate for the U9 players, Ally frequently looked for opportunities for development for the players and helped secure as much extra ice for the future all-stars that he could. This was the second year of the full-ice pilot within PCAHA and our teams loved the experience.

One of our most popular programs, Microhockey returned this year and we added a second division for the older players! Microhockey is a low stakes, no pressure once a week hockey program that allows players to develop the skills necessary to play full season hockey within a schedule that works for them. Coach Justin, Andrea, and Brad did an amazing job every week developing players, many of whom will be joining us in the regular season this fall. Volunteer Summary

Midway through the season, the sales guy admitted that their platform is not right for us and wants us to stop using it. There are a total of 17 families who didn't meet the 10 hrs. 2 families came close (7hr and 8hr). I might give them a pass. The other families are either close to 0 hrs or less than 5 hrs.

Spring Blast Update

I went out with a bang. I tried to make my last year of Spring Blast the best tournament I can run. I received a lot of unsolicited feedback that it's either the best tournament they've been to, or the most organized tournament they've been to. Here's a summary of the financials.

What's missing is the hotel commission from Hilton Metrotown. Without the hotel commission, we have net proceeds (after removing cost of ice) of around \$8800.

Livestream Summary

The livestream has continued to be a very popular initiative. Last year, we had a total of 26126 views. This season, we had a total of 39377 views. That's an increase of **50.7%**. We had a total of 15 teams streaming to the BMHA channel this season. Last year, we had 14 teams streaming (6 wildcats teams). So net increase in Bulldogs team streaming is **87.5%**.

Plays of the Month Summary

This initiative gained a lot of traction this season. It tells me that it's getting more acceptance from the community. In the 2024 season, I got a total of 67 submissions.

For the most recent 2025 session, I got a total of 177 submissions. That's an increase of **264%**.

House Senior's Night/Scholarship game

David Bershinsky raised \$1800 that he gave to BMHA last year to fund a scholarship tournament. We didn't have enough players participating so we made it a scholarship game. We spent \$900 of the fund to pay for stuff (flowers for 27 families and referees). The remaining \$900 was split to create two \$450 scholarships to any post secondary school. Colton Toivanen and Kalen Gulam won the scholarship. Can we honour them during the Award ceremony and give them a letter congratulating them and telling them how to redeem the scholarship?

Referee In Charge Annual year end report

2025-2026 was once again a busy season.

There were 632 games (U13 A and below) on the schedule for this season. The total number of games also included BWC's schedule. (The totals did not include the Burnaby tournaments as they were assigned by 3rd parties.)

Games began with rep tryouts at the end of August and the last game of the season was played on March 10.

One interesting game stat for this season was the day of the week that games were played.

Over 60% of all games were scheduled for the weekends.

Monday	9%	55 games
Tuesday	12%	78 games
Wednesday	4%	27 games
Thursday	4%	28 games
Friday	9%	56 games
Saturday	39%	244 games
Sunday	23%	144 games

The weekends were sometimes difficult to fully assign officials for all the games. There were a total 1532 positions assigned this season. (U7 – one official, U9 1-2 officials, U11 and up – 3 officials but sometimes two, depending on availability)

This past season, Burnaby Minor had an officiating roster that was almost 100 members.

With the departure of over thirty female officials going to the Wildcats association, there was big hole to fill in the officiating crew. Though the program could select and train as many officials as we wanted, the reality of it is that there are a limited number of games to officiate. Balancing the opportunities to enter the program with the number of games that one might be able to officiate is the biggest dilemma when it comes to recruiting new officials.

Planning and organizing for a clinic for new officials began in September. The selection process was conducted in October and saw 61 applicants. The number was down from the past two seasons which saw almost 100 applicants each season, but that had also included female applicants. Thirty officials were selected and attended the classroom session on November 2nd. The new recruits followed that up with their ice session on November 8th.

Apart from the BMHA clinic, seven other officials joined the fold by attending one of the BC Hockey summer schools. They took the time and effort to get trained and certified prior to the beginning of the season and were welcomed into the officiating team right away.

Also joining the officiating group were four other officials who had previously attended clinics hosted by other associations. At the time, there was not enough room to add them into the group of new officials as it was already at capacity. Overall, there were 40+ new officials for the 2025-2026 season.

Needless to say, it was very hectic assigning and training so many new officials. Most of them became very proficient with their skills and a few really excelled. I'm very proud of how much effort each and every official put into their games.

During the season, 88 were actively officiating all season.

Ten others were certified but inactive and were not able to find time to officiate. It is not unusual for kids to find that between playing on their teams, combined with school or other activities, that it does not leave any time left for officiating. I appreciate that they take the time to get certified and hopefully will find time in the future to put on the stripes.

This season saw a revamped mentorship program. BMHA made a commitment to invest more in the officiating program. Seven young mentors were enlisted into the program. The mentors varied in age and experience. Though it was only the first official year for the mentorship program, I felt it was important to bring in younger officials who can help build the program for the future seasons. The mentors supervised games from November to March. Overall, 64 officials were supervised. Each official was supervised a minimum of two games throughout the season. The mentorship program was very effective. Though I did not hear a lot of positive comments from teams (it's officiating after all), the number of complaints from coaches and managers was much less this season.

Officiating Highlights

Fenix Guay was selected to officiate in the U13 T2 provincials at Hollyburn Country Club

Darius Bezic was selected to officiate in the U15 T2 provincials at West Vancouver

Past BMHA member Adam Lian was also selected to officiate in the U15 T2 Championships at West Vancouver.

Thank you to every single person who has an influence on the officials. To every parent who brings their young official to the rink for their games...thank you. To the coaches, managers and players who treat the officials with respect... big thank you! Thank you to the parents that watch from the stands who respect the officials. Every positive event helps to keep the officials in the game.

Remember, hockey players can start skating and learning how to play from the tender age of 4 yrs old! Officials don't start learning their game until they reach 12! Many times, when you see an official, it could be their very first season! Yet, coaches and parents expect them to be perfect! Give them time, space and respect. Let them enjoy the game as much as the players.

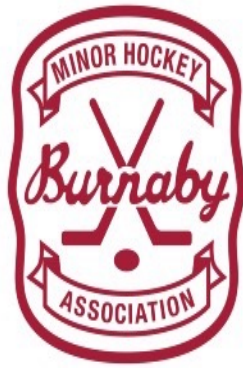

The bulk of our goalie gear sets go out to the U7 and U9 teams to give the chance to rotate through the position or try it out without the financial investment.
